November's Program

Dennis Yamamoto stepped us through the process of creating a stunning cherry console. He used a Thomas Moser design as suggested in a conversation with Yeung Chan. The figured cherry and maple lumber was obtained from www.bobkloes.com who imports his cherry from Pennsylvania.

Since the front of the console is curved, an extensive use of veneer laid over bendable plywood was made. The curved members were bent over a form and sealed in a vacuum bag until the glue was set. A wide variety of glues were used including Unibond 800, epoxy, urea formaldehyde, and Tite-Bond I and II. Joints were secured with Domino loose tenons and pocket screws.

The drawer sides are joined to the curved drawer fronts with sliding dovetails. Through dovetails join the drawer backs to the side pieces. Dennis pre-finishes all pieces with wipeon polyurethane before assembly to prevent the finish from puddling in the corners.









Show and Tell



Tracie Johnson described a step stool that she made from reclaimed wood. It's a design that her woodworking class make with small deviations. When finished, a water-based semi-gloss polyurethane was applied.





Jay Perrine shared pictures of his massive dining room table made from a large slab of madrone. He explained how he had to tweak the two metal legs, shaped like the letter "Z," so that the table sat firmly on the floor.





Dennis Yamamoto showed pictures of a fireplace mantel that he made from madrone for some friends of his. They don't show, but there are three LED lights facing down.





He also showed us pictures of two end tables where the bases are made from sapele and the tops are made from bookmatched redwood.





Ron Gerard created a small treasure box for his great granddaughter Joslyn made from a piece of claro walnut that was destined for the fireplace. The handle is made from ebony in the shape of the letter "J" with abalone accents. Inside, there is a removable tray with a tagua nut and brass knob. The bottom of the box is lined with purple velvet. Watco dark walnut oil stain was used as a finish with a coat of Breewax clear wax on top of the stain.
