

uest Chris Wiley is seeking help with two projects. The first one is help with making boxes for housing books. The boxes will be placed of front of people's houses so that neighbors can exchange books.

The second request is for help in making an English phone booth. She has a video about a Japanese man who lost family members in the tsunami and has an English phone booth in his yard in which he talks to his lost family members. She will bring the video to a later meeting.

om Kenyon reports that a member of the Westbay Woodturners has a Shop Smith dust collection system with many attachments for sale. See Tom if interested.

Program:

om Gaston presented a program about first aid for woodworkers.

Woodworkers should know some first aid techniques in case of an accident in the shop. It's even better if you can prevent the accident in the first place.

 Wear safety glasses or if working on a lathe, use a face shield. If you get something in your eye, flush it with saline solution or water. It works better if another person does it for you.

- Use a dust collector if you can or wear a dust mask.
- The loss of hearing is influenced by both time and intensity of loud noise so wear ear muffs or plugs.
- Using guards, a splitter and push sticks will prevent many accidents.
- Cuts are common in the shop. To treat cuts, press sides together until bleeding stops then clean cuts with soap and water. Cover wound with a Band-Aid and keep the cut as dry as possible. Electric tape works as an alternate to a Band-Aid and gel style super glue also works in sealing the cut.
- Drinking alcoholic beverages and operating machinery is a bad practice.
- Make sure electrical devices are properly grounded. It takes a very little electric shock to stop the heart from beating.
- A cell phone in the shop could be a lifesaver.
- Be aware of fatigue while working in the shop and stop working when you become tired.
- Having one or more fire extinguishers in the shop could prevent a major disaster.
- Keep your tetanus shot up to date.
- A pair of sharp tweezers works well in extracting splinters. A sewing needle is an acceptable substitute.
- Use common sense when working in the shop. If an operation doesn't look right, stop and devise an alternate method. Keep in mind that the table saw is the most hazardous machine with the router coming in at number two

Show and Tell:

om Gaston brought in one of two outdoor tables that he made to complement a couch. The legs and rails are what appears to be mahogany. He found the material alongside of a road. The top rails are



dovetailed into the legs and the legs are tapered on the outside to facilitate the making of the dovetail joints. The top is teak and is screwed to the base.

ike Papa created a Greene and Greene craftsman style lighted plant stand. The light is a remote controlled LED system. The frame is made from black walnut with ebony plugs while the figured opaque panels are paper.





Mike also showed us some F-style with clamps dovetailed feet. He demonstrated several ways in which the setup could be with the used clamps inserted in a plywood base. He also brought in the lid to a box that he had made several years ago that was



severely warped. A discussion ensued as to the reason for the warpage.

Ichard Winslow is working on a prototype of a leg design for a coffee table that will grace his granddaughter's house. There will be cross pieces that join the legs with mortise and tenon joints. He asked for suggestions on how to round over the pieces after the joints are made.



d Vincent made a stop that clamps to his table saw fence. The stop is used for locating the end of boards where multiple pieces need to be the same length while



crosscutting. He chased the female threads using a large hand screw clamp. A tool steel cutting tool was affixed to the end of one handle then screwed into the drilled hole. The threads on the shaft were chased on a metal lathe.
