He displayed spokeshaves, draw knives, shaving horses, various planes, a froe and several other tools explaining their function. The emphasis was on tools used by homeowners and farmers rather than professional or industrial workers. He then invited the members to use the tools.

FROE

A froe was used with a mallet or maul for riving boards or shingles from straight grained billets.

SHAVING HORSE

One style of horse has a large head above a ramp that applies pressure on the piece being shaped. The bodgers horse has a square foot lever with the ramp sloping down away from the user. This horse was used by the English craftsmen to shape chair legs by carrying it into beech forests. It is lighter in weight than the other horse.



DRAWKNIVES

Several drawknives were providing for use. They were used in conjunction with shaving horses. Drawknives were used to rough shape parts while being held in a shaving horse.

SPOKESHAVES

Spokeshaves further refined the shape of spindles for its intended use. Blair showed his favorite handmade spokeshave estimated to have been made in the late 1700's or early 1800's.



A BRACE FOR DRILLING HOLES

No bits were provided, but two tools were demonstrated that put a chamfer and a tenon on the end of a chair spindle. A dry spindle tenon was then driven into the green seat mortise to produce a tight fit.



PLANES

A large number of wooden planes were brought in and described. Blair explained that European planes were far more common than American ones because European craftsmen brought them when they emigrated to the U. S.

Adjusting wooden planes is accomplished by rapping the back of the plane body to loosen the blade or tapping the front to set the blade for a deeper cut.



Shops would have a large array of different shaped planes for making moldings and shaped features on their products. Hollow and rounds were fairly common types of wooden planes and were named by the shape that they produced. Craftsmen would choose soft straight grained wood such as redwood or pine with these planes to prevent tearout.

BOW SAWS

Bow saws are used for shaping curved details, but they are hard to master.

Show & Tell

Syd Dunton brought a small basket back from Vietnam a few months ago and created a duplicate. He made it from some bamboo cutoffs from a flooring job by stringing waxed thread through drilled holes then knotting the thread at each end. No finish was applied.



Tom Gaston turned two large bowls from camphor and finished them with mineral oil. He also created a piece of art using



sections of birch bark set in a picture frame. The birch bark was cut into small squares then glued to a backing by placing them in different orientations.



Tom Kenyon displayed two open segmented turned bowls. The maple one shows large differences in segment



thickness. Two different fixtures were required because of the different segment thickness. The wenge bowl incorporates looser layers.



Mike Papa brought in joint samples that he has been experimenting with. There was a picture frame with a through mortise and tenon miter joint. The second was a wedged lipped tabled lap joint and the third was a scarf joint.
